

<sup>1</sup>After this, the Moabites and Ammonites with some of the Meunites came to wage war against Jehoshaphat. <sup>2</sup>Some people came and told Jehoshaphat, “A vast army is coming against you from Edom, from the other side of the Dead Sea. ## Depend on God's Sovereignty

“God's sovereignty is the attribute by which He rules His entire creation, and to be sovereign God must be all-knowing, all-powerful, and absolutely free. The reasons are these: Were there even one [data] of knowledge, however small, un-known to God, His rule would break down at that point. To be Lord over all the creation, He must possess all knowledge...
